



The 28th Conference of the Parties to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP28) will take place in November 2023 at Expo City Dubai, United Arab Emirates. COP28 will unite the world towards agreement on bold, practical and ambitious solutions to the most pressing global challenge of our time.

COP28 marks the conclusion of the first Global Stocktake, a comprehensive assessment of progress towards the goals of the Paris Agreement. The COP28 UAE Presidency will work to ensure that the world responds with a clear plan of action, including measures to bridge gaps in progress.

HE Dr. Sultan al Jaber has noted that “Only 15% of clean tech investment reaches developing economies in the global south, and that is where 80% of the population live.” The UAE is working to ensure that COP28 is a COP for all and that no one is left behind.

Led by HE Dr. Sultan al Jaber, COP28 President-Designate, HE Shamma Al Mazrui, Youth Climate Champion, and HE Razan Al Mubarak, UN Climate Change High-Level Champion, the UAE will focus on finding practical solutions that ensure energy security while reducing emissions.

Areas of Focus

As host of COP28, the UAE has outlined four priority areas in which it plans to encourage action and elevate the global community’s collective ambition and achieve a major course correction to cut global emissions 43 percent by 2030.



Mitigation: Greatly expand **renewable energy generation** and low-carbon hydrogen production; transform **food and agriculture systems**; work with the energy industry to accelerate decarbonization and **reduce methane emissions**.



Adaptation: **Protect** the most vulnerable communities and most critical systems from climate impacts, such as extreme weather and biodiversity loss; invest in **nature-based solutions**; expand **adaptation finance** for the Global South.



Finance: Make climate finance more **affordable and accessible**; expand **private capital** directed toward climate solutions; answer the call from the international community for an **inclusive reform** of the multilateral development banks and international financial institutions.



Loss and Damage: Help the most vulnerable to **rebuild** after climate-related disasters; operationalize the **loss-and-damage fund**.

The UAE is a global hub for logistics, transportation and green technology, and is at the crossroads of business, commerce and tourism. The country is uniquely positioned to build bridges and foster consensus to accelerate inclusive climate progress.

The UAE and US are Working Together to Address Climate Change



- The UAE was the first country in the Middle East to sign and ratify the Paris Agreement, commit to an economy-wide reduction in emissions and announce an initiative to achieve net zero by 2050.
- Through the Agriculture Innovation Mission for Climate (AIM 4 Climate), the UAE and US are leading a group of over 40 countries to marshal \$8 billion in investments in R&D for climate-smart agri-tech.
- In November 2022, the UAE and US announced the Partnership for Accelerating Clean Energy (PACE), which will mobilize \$100 billion in commercial investment and other financing and deploy 100 new gigawatts of clean energy by 2035. An initial wave of \$20 billion will be allocated to fund 15 GW of clean and renewable energy projects in the US, led by UAE's Masdar and a consortium of US private investors.
- The UAE has a track record as one of the most active investors in US clean and renewable energy projects. Through Masdar, the UAE has backed ten clean energy projects totaling more than 1.75 GW across California, Texas, New Mexico and Nebraska.
- Internationally, the UAE is supporting and implementing clean energy projects on six continents, including in 31 small island-developing states in both the Caribbean and the Pacific Ocean.
